Igloolik Trip Report (May 14 - June 18, 2008)





Purpose of the trip:

To be introduced to the community of Igloolik
To continue the previous sea ice, trails, and environmental change work done by Gita Laidler and

Claudio Aporta

- Carry out interviews and mapping sessions with individuals from Igloolik
- To verify Inuktitut terminology and English translations for Noetix, in relation to the Floe Edge Service
- To develop Inuktitut descriptions for a bilingual sea ice dictionary
- To continue mapping and documenting local and regional sea ice features and knowledge

Activities during this trip:

- Worked with Theo Ikummaq on terminology and Inuktitut definitions
- Conducted 10 interviews with: Abraham Ulayuruluk, Theo Ikummaq, Jason Kunnuk, Moshi Kotierk, Elizabeth Peacock, Michelline Ammaq, Julia Amarualik, Lydia Qaumaq, Herve Paniak, Leah Otak
- Went on 3 sea ice trips with Theo Ikummaq as guide to document sea ice features
- Did a mapping workshop with Abraham Ulayuruluk, Nathan Qamaniq and Jaipiti Palluq to map trails between communities
- Had a small two day workshop on Inuktitut definitions with John Arnatsiaq and Theo Ikummaq



Next steps:

- <u>Summer 2008</u>: transcribe audio from interviews and digitize maps
- Fall 2008: analyze the transcripts and maps, compile the results, and begin to write reports and the draft of my dissertation on Inuit Perspectives on Climate Change
