#### PROJECT BACKGROUND

- This project began with a preliminary research trip in September, 2003.
- After consulting with the Hamlet Council, HTA, and other local organizations there was considerable support and interest in pursuing this sea ice project.
- Gita Laidler traveled to Pangnirtung four more times (April and December, 2004 & February and May, 2005) to conduct interviews, focus groups, and to go on several sea ice trips.
- Gita spent the fall of 2005, and winter of 2006, compiling all the results.

## RESULTS

- i) An understanding of the importance of sea ice to the community of Pangnirtung;
- ii) A description of sea ice freezing and melting processes according to local expertise;
- iii) A description of the influences of winds and currents on sea ice formation and movement, according to local expertise;
- iv) An understanding of the dangers involved with sea ice travel, and ways to minimize these risks:
- v) An understanding of the uses of sea ice for hunting purposes:
- vi) An understanding of some of the ways that **wildlife** use the sea ice as habitat
